Scripture Reading: Isaiah 1:1, 10-20

The Bible is God's chart to steer by, to keep one from the bottom of the sea, to show where the harbor is and how to reach it without running aground. —Henry Ward Beecher

If you were asked to describe the Bible, what would you say? You could start with the obvious and say it is like a book — a big book of little books inside. Perhaps, you could call it God's *autobiography*. However, hymnwriter William How (1823-1897), Irish and Anglican vicar, thought the Bible was "a golden *casket* where gems of truth are stored" (emphasis added). Perhaps it is a *key* that unlocks timeless truths. Or it is a *road map* or *GPS signal* that guides us safely to our eternal home. Or, it's a huge *text message* or *email* from God to the human race.

The Bible itself, however, describes itself as a *sword*: "The word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword" (Hebrews 4:12; see also Ephesians 6:17). In Psalm 119:105, we read, "Your word is a *lamp* to my feet and a *light* to my path" (emphasis added). Jesus described it as *bread*, when he said to the devil, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God'" (Matthew 4:4). Finally, the apostle Peter thought of the Bible as *milk*, saying "Like newborn babies, crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation" (1 Peter 2:2).

I like how the following poem, attributed to John Clifford, imagines the word of God. The poem is called "The Anvil of God's Word."

Last eve I paused beside the blacksmith's door, And heard the anvil ring the vesper chime; Then looking in, I saw upon the floor, Old hammers, worn with beating years of time.

"'How many anvils have you had, ' said I, 'To wear and batter all these hammers so?' 'Just one,' said he, and then with twinkling eye, 'The anvil wears the hammers out, you know.'

"And so, I thought, the Anvil of God's Word For ages skeptic blows have beat upon; Yet, though the noise of falling blows was heard, The Anvil is unharmed, the hammers gone."

Yes, just like this ancient anvil, God's word will endure forever.

Without hesitation, the girl replied, "I want to be happy!"

"So be it," said the fairy, and vanished.

As the little girl grew up, she realized there was no one else in the land as happy as she. Others marveled at her contagious sense of joy. When people asked her where that joy came from — what was her secret? — she would only smile and reply, "The secret of my happiness is that I listened to a good fairy when I was a little girl."

As she grew older, the parade of visitors only increased. Everyone was afraid that, when she died, the secret to true happiness could die with her. "Tell us, please," her neighbors begged. "Tell us what the good fairy said."

"It's very simple, really," said the young-woman-now-grown-old. "The fairy told me that all people, without regard to education, no matter their age, rich or poor, had need of me."

Think about this for a few moments. Do you think it is a universal truth, or one that might apply only to certain individuals? Does it apply to you? *Are you happiest when you are needed*?

Perhaps you do not feel needed, and it makes you sad. But think about what people need, and you might realize that you are needed more than you thought.

A frustrated woman in a counseling session explained to the therapist what she wanted from her husband: "All I want is not much more than my dog wants from him. When my husband comes home, our dog barks and runs to him, tail a-wagging, waiting for three things to happen: first, a kind look; second, a friendly word; and third, a loving touch. A look, a word, a touch; that's all I really want in this relationship."

That's all most people need and want. And you can offer it, every day! Notice people. Speak to people. And in these days of Covid-19, instead of a touch or hug, give someone a fist bump! They will love you for it! —Timothy Merrill

A coording to the U.S. Census Bureau, approximately 78 million people 65 and older will reside in America by 2035. This figure will surpass the population under the age of 18 for the first time in the nation's history.

National Senior Citizens Day recognizes seniors who have spent their lives contributing to society and have impacted everyone's lives for the better. Improved healthcare has changed demographics and increased productivity of older citizens, allowing them to be more active than ever before. With more opportunities available as well, many senior citizens now begin second careers and are an example for younger generations. The country's foundation and stable sectors are the result of the hard work of our senior citizens, and they deserve all our gratitude.

President Ronald Reagan took the initiative to honor seniors in 1988 when he signed Proclamation 5847 and marked August 21 as the day seniors will be celebrated. "Throughout our history, older people have achieved much for our families, our communities, and our country. That remains true today, and gives us ample reason this year to reserve a special day in honor of the senior citizens who mean so much to our land," Reagan proclaimed. "For all they have achieved throughout life and for all they continue to accomplish, we owe older citizens our thanks and a heartfelt salute. We can best demonstrate our gratitude and esteem by making sure that our communities are good places in which to mature and grow older — places in which older people can participate to the fullest and can find the encouragement, acceptance, assistance, and services they need to continue to lead lives of independence and dignity."

His words have withstood the test of time and are now, over 30 years later, more important than ever as older people are leading more productive lives. Reagan himself set an example for everyone. He was 69 years old when one of the world's most powerful titles of president of the U.S. was given to him on January 20, 1981. Reagan lived till the ripe old age of 93, and not only was he the oldest person to be elected president, he was also the oldest when his term ended at 77 years and 349 days.

Scripture Reading: Luke 14:1, 7-14

Last winter, motorists passing across the Forbes Avenue bridge over Fern Hollow Creek in Pittsburgh's Frick Park were shocked when it collapsed! At least 10 people were injured; the tally could have been more severe. Thankfully, no one perished.

According to one report, an analysis of "607,380 bridges from the latest National Bridge Inventory, [showed] that 65,605 were 'structurally deficient' — needing repair or replacement because at least one major component has serious problems — and 20,808 were 'fracture critical,' which means there is no backup to prevent the bridge from collapsing if a key element fails. Even worse, 7,795 bridges fell under both categories."

"We have a term for unsafe bridges, and that is 'closed," Massachusetts State Highway Administrator Frank DePaola said.

In "The Wired Word," a sister publication of *HomeTouch*, this story was addressed in the weekly lesson last winter. One of the questions posed by the curriculum was: "Where do you see signs of stress, fracture and deterioration in your personal life, after two years of pandemic?"

It's a pertinent question because many of us long for the days when it was not so difficult to be among friends. One had a social life then. We had fewer things to worry about, and Lord knows we have our share as it is, without a pandemic. So, to keep our social and spiritual bridges from collapsing takes some thoughtful care and planning.

Another series of questions were: "What are the foundations of your faith? What practices do you use to regularly ensure the foundation is strong? When have you experienced cracks in the foundation of your faith? What was the cause? What repairs were needed? Were they short-term or longer-term repairs?"

There's a lot to think about when considering these questions. In a final analysis, we might need to decide whether we've built our "house" on sand or solid rock. (See Matthew 7:24-29.)
